Parking: All Saints Church, Broad Chalke (subject to services).

Terrain: Easy going with wide open paths and tracks, with one incline. There are some short sections of narrow paths. Some uneven sections along the River Ebble valley.

Length: Approximately 7.0 miles / 11.2km.

Approximate time: 3 hours.

Dogs: Must be on leads for most of the route.

Good to know: Bus route 29 runs between Salisbury and Shaftesbury stopping at Broad Chalke.

Refreshments: The Queens Head and Chalke Valley Stores in Broad Chalke. The information is only intended as a general guide. Please check local arrangements.



## **Directions**

- On leaving the car park, turn left and walk into the village centre. Turn left on meeting the Queen's Head and follow the road round to the right. Where the road turns left, carry straight on up the lane to Chalk Pyt Farm.
- 2 Once into the farm, turn left at the bridleway sign past farm buildings on your left. After the last large barn on your right, bear right on a well-signed path between two hedges.
- When the hedges end keep straight ahead beside the fence. on your right. On reaching the tarmac hardstanding which forms the turning space at the top of the Gurston Down Speed Hill Climb race track, bear slightly to the right, but to the left of the barn, onto the concrete surface of the signposted public bridleway. After 75 metres, the surface changes to stone.
- 4 Keep straight ahead along the bridleway to reach a metal. gate that gives access onto the Old Shaftesbury Drove.
- 5 Turn left along the drove. After approximately 800 metres cross the road (beware of traffic) and continue along the drove for another 650 metres, passing the Fovant Hut (once a drovers' rest stop but now a private house) along the way until a track forks away to the left.
- 6 After about 50 metres, the track reaches a gate, where waymarks point to a bridleway directly across the field and a restricted byway that bears to the left, past a narrow belt of trees on the left and along a grass track across the fields.
- Ontinue along the byway, following the track for about 1.6km as it descends gently to reach the road at a gate beside which is a gap. Turn left along the road, to reach a sharp bend at Manor Farm in the hamlet of Fifield Bayant.

- and on to visit the 13th Century St Martin's Church.
- To continue on the walk, retrace your steps out of the farmyard and before you reach the road, go through the small wooden gate on your left and head half right down the hill to a small wooden bridge over the Ebble.
- Cross the field to the raised bank ahead and turn left to continue walking along the valley where you may be fortunate to see a heron fishing in the river, passing through two gates to reach a lane at Little London. Continue straight ahead along the lane then just after a passing place on the right, turn left onto the signposted public footpath through a metal gate.
- Head down the slope to a gate and footbridge. Follow the fenced and hedged path beside the garden of a bungalow, turning right where a path to the left leads uphill to the road, and continue to and along a tarmac driveway, with the watercress beds to your right.

12 At the road, go straight ahead through a gate at Knapp Farmhouse. Pass the house and keep to the right along the footpath to go through a gate. Follow

the path to a second gate then across the field, beside the river, then through another gate.

Follow the path ahead, bearing left to continue between gardens and then straight ahead along a stone road to return to Broad Chalke. Turn right onto the main village road to return to the church.
