

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## Fordingbridge to Alderholt The outward leg of an optional circular walk
















## **Directions**

- 1 Pass through the timber lych gate of St. Mary's Church onto the footpath to the left of the church. Leaving the churchyard, take the signposted footpath ahead to pass a house on the right and then between fields. Pass the sewage works to reach a t-junction of footpaths.
- 2 Turn right onto the path along the edge of fields. To the left, across the fields, the nests of a heronry sit high in the trees. At the woodland ahead, follow the path which becomes a wider track, curving left and uphill before opening out onto a track at the top.
- 3 Turn right, then at a waymarked post turn left, to a gate and stile into a field.
- 4 Keep straight ahead across the field to a stile on the far side and turn right along the narrow path to a track where a row of cottages stands to your left. The old farm buildings at Midgham Farm are away to your right. Turn left along the track to meet a quiet road.
- 5 Turn right along the road as far as Highfield Farm. Take the signposted footpath through a narrow metal gate alongside two larger gates, along the track past the buildings on your left then between fields until the track turns sharply to the right. Go through the gate ahead of you into a field, with a copse ahead.

- Go downhill to the right of the copse to stiles and a footbridge. Continue uphill and follow the signs through the Wolvercroft Garden Centre with its Sticky Bun Tea Room and through a field with the hedge on the right to a gate and stile into an area of woodland at Bonfire Hill. Across the way is a track beyond which are a gate and stile. Once over the stile, there is a second gate and stile. The footpath then leads downhill to reach the junction of Hillbury Road and Station Road at Alderholt
- 7 Cross Hillbury Road, continuing through the village along Station Road. Cross Ringwood Road, bearing right along the footway then left into Blackwater Grove, continuing past houses until the road becomes a bridleway between fields and woods.
- The bridleway opens out onto Cranborne Common. Stay on the track until reaching a gate directly ahead. The track turns sharply to the left, but take the signposted footpath to the right. Follow the footpath to a footbridge with stiles and continue until it emerges onto a stone track with an open area to the left used as parking for a private fishing ground through which our route continues. Follow the waymarked path to a gate and stile between houses to reach the road opposite St. James's Church. Cross the road to the parking area anext to the Church.

Part 2 of the walk, reference number 29b, back to St Mary's Church in Fordingbridge, starts here.
